Village Council News:

Organizational Meeting:

Tyler Lindsay has been elected for the position of Mayor for the next year and Danny LeCain has been elected for the position of Deputy Mayor all taking place at Councils Organizational Meeting held on October 15th, 2014. Committee selection was also done at that meeting, anyone wishing as list of council committee list please contact the Village office.

Tax Arrears:

Mayor Lindsay moved that the Village of Warner send Tax Arrears notices to all residents that are 2 or more years in arrears. If the tax arrears are not paid by March 31st, 2015 the Village of Warner will start the Tax Arrears recovery process as described in the Municipal Government Act of Alberta.

Burning Bylaw:

Village Council discussed the possibilities of developing a Burning Bylaw with the purpose of establishing the days burning would be allowed, times and possible fines if burning outside of the designated days. The new bylaw should be ready for first reading by council in January, once first reading is given the bylaw will be advertised and the residents of Warner will be able to review the bylaw and provide their input before going forward.

Winter Snow Removal:

Yes it is that time of year again. Council and staff are asking for the Village resident's cooperation by moving all recreation vehicles off the streets for the winter snow removal season (November-April) to assist are staff in clearing off the roads without having to go around recreation vehicles parked on residential streets. Also if you could park your cars, trucks and trailers off the residential streets after any snow fall it would also assist Village staff in clearing the streets in a timely manner.

Information about the Village: - the projects that have been completed are > The 7th Avenue Drain \$17000.00 - Funded by MSI (Municipal Strategy Initiative)

* Main street water valve replacements, curbs, gutters, Handicap accessible sidewalks and pavement. \$250,000.00 - funded by MSI.

* New pump for water distribution which includes upgrading electrical and

rebuild the 2 old pumps. \$35,000.00 - funded by the gas tax

* All sewer lines in town were flushed and camera'd. This found some issues that need repair and or replaced. \$45,000.00 These issues will be covered in the 2015 budget.

* The old public washrooms in the arena have been renovated, to be more energy efficient. \$ 12,000.00. The Referee's room will be the next to be refurbished.

* New energy lights were installed in the Fire Hall - \$6,500.00

* Still on the list for completion this fall is 6 to 8 main valves, and 4 to 5 hydrants replaced. That pretty much clears the list for 2014.

For next year 2015 - paving the spots around town that need to be fixed, along with some curbs and gutters.

Alberta's population is aging due to declining fertility rates and rising life expectancies, although the province remains one of the youngest populations in the country. The baby boomers, who were born between 1946 and 1965, accounted for almost a quarter of Alberta's population in 2013. As the baby boomers get older, the aging of the population in Alberta is expected to accelerate until 2030, when the last of that group reaches the age of 65. At the Grey Matters Conference on Seniors Issues held in Red Deer on October 1st and 2nd this year the demand for accessible and appropriate transportation in urban and rural Alberta was discussed. "Mobility is central to healthy aging. Public transportation is often seen as the solution to maintaining mobility when driving is no longer an option. Public transportation options can be challenging in rural

communities. Alberta's aging population will increase the demand for accessible and appropriate transportation, including alternate transportation services to support mobility and social inclusion."

"Safe driving isn't about your age, it's about your ability" states the Alberta Motor Association.

Increasing age brings a greater likelihood of having at least one medical condition that could affect your safety while driving. Diabetes, Cardiovascular Disease, Parkinsons, Alzheimers and Arthritis are a few examples. The presence of a medical condition does not necessarily mean that your ability to drive will be restricted.

It is important to know the facts, understand the risks and seek help to properly manage your health to keep you safe behind the wheel. Early

planning is the key to staying safe and mobile. Drive Safely Tips for Aging Drivers are available at the Alberta Motor Association office or online at [ama.ab.ca/Aging Drivers](http://ama.ab.ca/Aging%20Drivers).

At age 75, 80, and every two years after, all drivers must provide a medical report from a doctor to renew a driver's licence.

Alternative transportation includes Family and Friends, Public Transit, Taxi/Driving Services, Volunteer Driving Services, Private Program Services (Seniors Centres, Churches, and Local Businesses), Walking/ Cycling and Horseback Riding.
