# Viability Reviews

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# What is a Viability Review

A viability review is a process where a municipality's governance, finances, infrastructure and services are reviewed to determine whether changes are required for the community to remain viable. The process which is described below, allows an objective analysis of the review municipality's issues and challenges, and in some cases, lead to the development of a Viability Plan which outlines the options available to the community for the community to be viable.

A viability review is not intended to examine council, decision making processes, roles and responsibilities. or intra-council conflict. It is also not intended to assess administrative and financial processes and practices within the municipality.

A viability review is led by a committee called the Viability Review Team (VRT) that consists of representatives from Municipal Affairs, the review municipality, neighbouring municipality and municipal associations (Alberta Association of Municipal Districts and Counties, Alberta Rural Municipal Administrators Association, Alberta Summer Villages Association (where applicable), Alberta Urban Municipalities Association, and the Local Government Administration Association). Each viability review team has a mandate which includes: leading the review municipality through the viability review process, developing a viability plan if required, engaging with stakeholders and liaising with their respective organizations.

Stakeholder engagement and community involvement is an integral component of the viability review process. During the viability review, the community is typically engaged through a combination of mailed communications, surveys, open houses, public meetings and if required, public votes.

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# The Viability Review Process

A viability review is initiated following one of the following: a council request, a petition from the electors of a municipality, or when a municipality triggers key measures of sustainability as defined in the Municipal Sustainability Strategy. Once a request is received by Municipal Affairs, ministry staff will review the request (in the case of a petition, a ministry representative will determine the sufficiency of the petition) and conduct a screening to determine what viability issues exists in the municipality, and if an alternate Municipal Affairs process such as a municipal corporate review, a municipal inspection, an audit or other restructuring process such as amalgamation is more appropriate to address the issues found in the municipality. If a viability review is determined to be the most appropriate process, the Minister will initiate a viability review for the municipality.

A viability review typically consists of two phases: the Viability Determination phase and the Viability Plan phase.

The viability determination phase involves the formation of the Viability Review Team, information collection and analysis, stakeholder engagement, and the initiation of an infrastructure assessment or infrastructure audit. At the end of the this phase, the Viability Review Team will make a viability determination. The review municipality will be determined to be either clearly viable, or trending towards non-viability. If the review municipality is determined to be clearly viable, the viability review will be concluded. If the review municipality is determined to be trending towards non-viability, the viability review continues to the second phase where a Viability Plan is developed for the community.

The Viability Plan phase consists of additional information gathering and analysis, facilitated discussions with all affected municipalities, and the development of a Viability Plan. Additional community engagement may also be conducted during this phase. The Viability Plan will provide the community with options to achieve viability. Options vary depending on the municipality being reviewed, but typically there are a minimum of two options. These options include the review municipality remaining as a municipality, but changes are made to the way the municipality is administered or governed; and the review municipality is dissolved (unincorporated) into an adjacent municipality. At the end of the Viability Plan phase, the council of the review municipality vote on the options. If council votes in favour of dissolution, a public vote is held by ministry staff to determine the community's preference on the options presented.

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# Frequently Asked Questions about Viability Reviews

### **About the Process**

1. How long does a viability review take?

The typical length of a viability review is approximately nine to twelve months. Some viability reviews may take longer due to time needed for the municipality to complete an infrastructure audit, council or staff vacancies, or other reasons.

2. Where does the information for a viability review come from?

The information reviewed and analyzed for a viability review comes from a variety of sources including, but not limited to: federal and provincial governments, municipal councils and administrations, residents and property owners within the municipality, and other stakeholders.

3. What is the cost of a viability review and who is responsible to pay for the costs of a viability review?

The cost of a viability review varies depending on the costs of the infrastructure audit, the amount of information that needs to be reviewed and analyzed, the number of meetings required, and travel to meetings for staff and each member of the Viability Review Team. Alberta Municipal Affairs pays for ministry staff time associated with researching, writing, printing, and distributing information and reports, as wellas the cost of hosting public meetings and other community engagement activities. In addition, Municipal Affairs provides municipalities that are undergoing a viability review with a grant to pay for an infrastructure audit. Municipalities undergoing a viability review will incur costs for staff time to compile information for Municipal Affairs, travel costs to meetings, remuneration for councillors to attend Viability Review Team meetings, and costs of additional council meetings.

- 5. How can I participate in a viability review? How can I get involved?

  Members of the community that is being reviewed will be provided with opportunities to provide input into the viability review process. This may be in the form of surveys, delegations to Viability Review Team meetings, open houses and public meetings. At the end of the viability review process, a vote of electors may be held in the municipality should council vote to dissolve the municipality.

## 6. Who can vote?

If a vote of electors is held at the end of a viability review, the vote will be held by Municipal Affairs, in accordance with the Local Authorities Election Act. The Local Authorities Election Act specifies that in order to be eligible to vote, the person must be: at least 18 years of age, a Canadian citizen, a resident of Alberta for the six months immediately preceding election day; and the person's place of residence is located in the area on election day. Residents of another municipality do not meet the residency requirements found in the Local Authorities Election Act and are therefore unable to vote. There are also no provisions in the Local Authorities Election Act to

permit individual property owners to vote if they do not reside in the municipality where the vote is held.

#### **About Dissolution**

#### 7. What is dissolution?

Dissolution is a municipal restructuring process that is permitted in Sections 130 to 134.1 of the *Municipal Government Act*. Dissolution results in the unincorporation of a municipality. Local governance for the area of a dissolved municipality is typically transferred to a neighbouring municipality. The impact of dissolution will vary based on the municipality. The community that may be affected by a dissolution will be informed of the potential impact of dissolution in the Viability Plan prior a votes on the issue of dissolution.

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# How to Request a Viability Review

Viability reviews may be initiated through one of three ways - by council request, by a petition of the electors of a municipality, or when a municipality triggers key measures of sustainability as defined in the Municipal Sustainability Strategy.

A **council request** may be made when a municipal council passes a resolution to request a viability review and a written request is submitted to the Minister of Municipal Affairs. A council request should include a completed <u>self-assessment questionnaire</u> from the <u>Municipal Sustainability Strategy</u>.

A petition from electors numbering at least 30% of the population of the municipality may be submitted to the Minister of Municipal Affairs. A petition should be prepared according to the guidelines found in the Information Handout on Petitions intended for the Minister of Municipal Affairs to ensure that all legislated requirements are met. To assist propspective petitioners with the petition process, a petition has been developed which is available for download here. A petition to the Minister must include a statement of Representative of Petitioners, and an affidavit for each person that witnessed the signing of a petition.

When a municipality triggers the key measures of sustainability, the Minister of Municipal Affairs may undertake a viability review of that municipality.
